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7-YEAR-OLD AVAH MERILLAT TEACHES AGELESS LESSONS ON GRACE, CHARACTER

Crissey Elementary is not your ordinary school. "Avah always has a smile on her face," Ms. Carlin said. "Her favorite words are 'sure!' and 'ok!"

"We are so proud of Avah," Steffenie said. "In our home, good character is celebrated above good grades. Raising kids to become adults with strong morals, good judgment and self discipline is a huge task, and is not easy. So as a parent, it is so rewarding to see good character recognized in your child at school."

In order to help others demonstrate good character, we asked 7-year-old Avah how she does it. She said:

- I help others when they need help
- If I see someone who is sad or lonely, I talk to them and ask them to join me and friends. I make sure to introduce her and tell her all my friends' names.
- If kids are mean to me, I just walk away. I chose not to be mean back.

BEWARE OF THE IRS SCAM THAT COULD COST YOU THOUSANDS By Fred Boyk



Tax season is stressful enough without the added fear of getting scammed.

If you get a call from an individual claiming that he or she is an IRS agent and there is a warrant out for your arrest for unpaid taxes, the caller is most likely an imposter.

This exact scenario happed twice to two of my clients this year. They were told to load money onto a prepaid debit card from Wal-Mart, and warned that they only had a couple of hours to do so. An "agent" would call back to get the debit card information, and claim that a federal officer would be taking them into custody if the transfer was

not made. These calls would come in over the weekend and outside of the IRS's normal business hours, so that the victims would not be able to contact the IRS to verify the agent's story.

Here are some important facts about the IRS to help the same scam from happening to you:

- The IRS alerts taxpayers of unpaid taxes in writing, not over the phone
- The IRS does not accept debit card numbers or wire transfers over the phone
- The IRS will never contact you by phone without your permission, and never on the weekends

In general, it is imperative to be very careful when dealing with an unknown person on the telephone. Authoritative, official-sounding voices may really be attempts to fraudulently induce you to turn over your hard-earned funds.

If you are not sure of the validity of a call demanding payment for a tax debt, contact your local police, the FBI, or the IRS at 1-800-829-1040.
