

Seven Years After Near-Fatal Accident, Boyk Law Client To Publish Memoir About Life-Changing Experiences



Aimee Ross was living a perfectly normal life raising three kids, married to her high school sweetheart, and teaching at her high school alma mater.

Life was perfect—right until it wasn't.

Unhappy in her marriage, Aimee asked for a divorce. Three days later, she suffered a heart attack at age forty-one. Five months after that, she survived a near-fatal car crash caused by an intoxicated driver.

Her physical recovery took months and left her body marked by scars. The emotional recovery, though, would take longer, as Aimee sought to forgive the man who almost killed her—and to forgive herself for tearing apart her family.

In March 2018, Aimee—who was represented by the Charles E. Boyk Law Offices after her car

accident—will release her first book, *Permanent Marker: A Memoir*, in which she chronicles how her life was transformed by her experiences in 2010

In this Q&A, Aimee shares how her writing her book enabled her to process and heal from the traumas she endured.

What prompted you to write a memoir?

I had to understand what happened to me: Who had I been and who did I become? I knew I was different. I knew something life-changing had happened to me, and I needed to understand how it had affected me so deeply.

How did reliving your most painful experiences affect you? Did it feel therapeutic, or was it harder than you anticipated?

I've been working on this for more than six years, to tell the truth. When I first started writing, it was only about the accident. Before I knew it, the story of my divorce and heart attack was bubbling out of me without control. Within months, I realized that even though I'd chosen to get divorced, the heart attack and accident just happened to me; my first reaction was that karma was paying me back. Guilt made me wonder if I had deserved all of what happened, and ultimately, that's when I started asking the bigger questions of myself. As the book explains, writing most definitely became my therapy. I cried a lot and processed a lot. And thank goodness, because it worked.

What makes a great memoir?

A great memoir, no matter the writer's experience, makes you feel as if you have been through it with her. Not only does the writer have a voice that's relatable and realistic, her story has universal qualities that help you identify with it

while making you feel something.

What's the primary takeaway you hope readers get from Permanent Marker?


Ultimately, I think we're all asking the same questions of ourselves: Why am I here? What is my purpose in life? How do I get through this struggle? Memoirs are the perfect genre to find possible answers in others' experiences to help us answer our own.

What would you say to someone who was facing a similar situation, like a car accident injury?

I would tell them not to be afraid to ask for help, because you can't do it alone. After my accident, my brother Brian connected with Chuck Boyk and his staff, and I'm still so grateful. Chuck's office made sure that everything was taken care of regarding medical costs, missing work, etc., and left no stone unturned. Having Chuck and his staff on my side allowed me to focus on my recovery and, as a result, heal so that I could tell my story.

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








TPS Proud Kicks Off at Sherman Elementary

RECIPE: Julia's French Apple Cake

This delightful fall treat is the perfect spin on traditional apple pie. Served warm or cold, it pairs nicely with homemade whipped cream.

INGREDIENTS

- ¾ cup all-purpose flour
- ¾ teaspoon baking powder
- Pinch of salt
- 4 large apples
- 2 large eggs
- ¾ cup sugar
- 3 tablespoons dark rum
- ½ teaspoon pure vanilla extract
- 8 tablespoons (1 stick) unsalted butter, melted and cooled

DIRECTIONS

- 1. Center a rack in the oven and preheat the oven to 350°F. Generously butter an 8-inch springform pan and put it on a baking sheet lined with a silicone baking mat or parchment paper and put the springform on it.
- 2. Whisk the flour, baking powder, and salt together in small bowl.
- 3. Peel the apples, cut them in half and remove the cores. Cut the apples into 1- to 2-inch chunks.

- 4. In a medium bowl, beat the eggs with a whisk until they're foamy. Pour in the sugar and whisk for a minute or so to blend. Whisk in the rum and vanilla. Whisk in half the flour and when it is incorporated, add half the melted butter, followed by the rest of the flour and the remaining butter, mixing gently after each addition so that you have a smooth, rather thick batter. Switch to a rubber spatula and fold in the apples, turning the fruit so that it's coated with batter. Scrape the mix into the pan and poke it around a little with the spatula so that it's evenish.
- 5. Slide the pan into the oven and bake for 50 to 60 minutes, or until the top of the cake is golden brown and a knife inserted deep into the center comes out clean; the cake may pull away from the sides of the pan. Transfer to a cooling rack and let rest for 5 minutes.
- 6. Carefully run a blunt knife around the edges of the cake and remove the sides of the springform pan. (Open the springform slowly, and before it's fully opened, make sure there

aren't any apples stuck to it.) Allow the cake to cool until it is just slightly warm or at room temperature. If you want to remove the cake from the bottom of the springform pan, wait until the cake is almost cooled, then run a long spatula between the cake and the pan, cover the top of the cake with a piece of parchment or wax paper, and invert it onto a rack. Carefully remove the bottom of the pan and turn the cake over onto a serving dish.



Head-On Car Accident Leaves Woman Faces Permanent Entire Family Injured Hair Loss After Being Left

Our clients suffered multiple injuries after another car went left of center, striking their car head-on. The father suffered a foot fracture that will need surgery to repair and the mother loss consciousness at the scene and suffered a traumatic brain injury. One son had to have 25 stitches in his face for which he is still under the care of a plastic surgeon, and suffered a fractured right hand and dental injuries. Their other son had serious bruising and had to see emergency room dentists to treat the trauma to his mouth.

Woman Faces Permanent Hair Loss After Being Left Under Steamer Too Long At A Local Salon

Third degree burns left a seven-centimeter hole in our client's scalp after a steam processor at a local salon allegedly malfunctioned. She faces the need for multiple plastic surgeries and skin grafting to repair the damage, which will also leave her with permanent hair loss at the injury site, in additional to severe stress and anxiety about the situation.

Husband & Father Passes Away After Doctors Miss Heart Attack Warning Signs

A farmer who was otherwise healthy and in good shape was experiencing warning signs indicative of serious cardiac problems. He consulted his doctor right away, but instead of having the man undergo immediate testing, the physician ordered the tests to be done the following week. The man passed away the next day from a heart attack that experts believe could have easily been prevented.
